Hurrah for Muskrats MN Con. Volunteer Aug 2020

Muskrats are not really rats, but rodents like squirrels and beavers, which all have long front teeth. Muskrats have two layers of fur: long heavy guard hairs, which protect the soft inner layer of hair. This under-fur traps tiny air bubbles that helps the animal float. Underfur also helps keep the muskrat's skin dry and warm. With this protection, they can remain active throughout most of the year.



I In winter, several muskrats may cozy up inside a lodge to stay warm. Instead of storing food for winter they swim out daily to find fresh plants, and sometimes will eat critters like cray fish. In extreme cold they keep inside for days and can chew on the walls of their home. Since the lodge is made of the same plants they can eat.
